Minutes of the April 2009 Board of Directors Meeting

The April 2009 meeting of Officers and Directors was held at 5 pm, April 4th, at the Village Inn Restaurant, Bettendorf. Main topics of discussion were:

Changes to By-Laws. The following updates to the existing club by-laws were discussed.

- **Article II - Finances - Section 1:** Discussion on a member proposal to change the way in which membership dues are calculated. The proposal was to make membership effective for 12 months from the date when dues are paid. For example, if

membership dues are paid in April, membership would remain active through March of the following year. **After lengthy discussion it was decided that no change would be made to current membership rules. The club currently does not have the staffing that would be required to track membership anniversary dates for each member.**

- **Amended Constitution - Article II - Membership:** Discussion on a proposal of drop the membership type referred to as "Youth Group" as shown in the Club Constitution Article II - Membership. There is currently no active Youth Group member within the club. Due to liabilities we do not foresee having young members joining without a parent or guardian. Currently young members are part of the club thru the "Family membership" option. This proposal was accepted to be put before the members.

- **Amended Constitution - Article II - Membership:** The following membership categories and definitions were discussed to be made:

Type	Proposed definition additions
Individual	Individuals 18 to 59 years of age.
Family	Couples and families with children under 18 years of age
Honorary	Known as a friend to the club, voted on by club to be given an Honorary membership. E.g. Geologists, Professors, Our annual Scholarship student.
Lifetime	Individuals with 15 or more years of active club membership. Active being defined as a person who has assisted the club by serving on the board and/or volunteering at the club shows.

This proposal was accepted to be put before the members.

- **By-Laws - Article III - Duties of Officers - Sec. 5:** Proposal to allow the Rock Show Chairman to write checks upon board approval; currently only the President and Vice President have this authority. This proposal was accepted to be put before the members.

Spring Rock Show. Kellie Moore, Rock Show Chairperson, initiated discussion on several areas that need to be finalized prior to the 2009 rock show at the Putnam Museum. Major areas of discussion were:

- Kellie and Craig Moore were authorized by the board to acquire an additional 25 signs for the show. Craig will be coordinating with various business and land owners in the Iowa Quad Cities to place signs advertising the show. There are currently no plans to post signs in the Illinois Quad Cities, but several officers expressed an interest in assisting with this effort. We would appreciate any help with contacting potential sign location land owners to gain permission to put signs on their property for the week of the show.
- Club members planning to help with show set up need to be at the Putnam by 8:30 a.m. on April 17th. Volunteers are being sought to assist with transporting displays and other club property to the Putnam. Contact Kellie Moore at 563-445-3034 if you can help with transport and set up.
- Connie Huber will be responsible for club sales and staffing.
- Delores Bates will be responsible for the admissions table and staffing.

The Vibratory Tumbler

In Feb 2008 I bought a vibratory tumbler. It was a Model MT-45V made by Diamond Pacific. In this tumbler there are no moving parts, only an electro magnet. This results in about 3,600 vibrations per minute. The hopper holds about 4 lbs of rock. The on-off control knob also serves as an adjustment for the intensity of the action. If you buy this or a similar tumbler, READ THE OWNER'S MANUEL very carefully. This simple act will save you a lot of trouble.

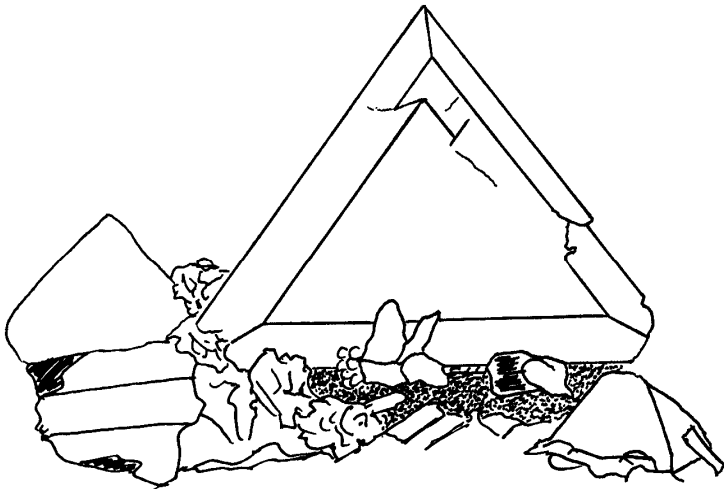
A vibratory tumbler cuts down the batch processing time a lot, but what it won't do is round-off or remove a lot of matrix from your rocks. I use my rotary tumbler to put my batches thru the 80- and 220 grit. This will shape and round - off your rocks. When these coarse grits have done their job I move my rocks to the vibratory tumbler for the 600 grit. This stage is mainly to get your rocks ready for a polish and the vibratory tumbler will do this in just a few days. Again, read the owner's manual! Make no mistake, the vibratory tumbler can be a bit of a problem. Not enough rock in the hopper and it won't work, too much water and it won't work, too little water and it won't work either. The point is, if you get everything right you're in business. I followed the manual very closely for the first few batches, had success and just went from there.

One of my real problems was finishing Apache Tears in the rotary tumbler. So I took my pre-finished tears (up thru 220 grit) and loaded them in the vibratory tumbler with 600 grit and some larger plastic beads. The small beads I use in the rotary tumbler are too small and light weight and just won't do in the vibratory tumbler. I start the tumble and use a spray bottle to add just enough water to get everything moving. You must check the hopper 3 or 4 times every day. As the grit

works it causes the resulting sludge to thicken and you must add just enough water to keep everything moving smoothly. In a few days you will wash the tears and beads. Save these beads for your next batch with 600 grit. Put your washed tears, new beads and polish in the hopper. Add just enough water and you are off and running. I figure a week for the polish cycle. I start with Raybrite A or micro-washing off the polish. After 4 or 5 days I add some tin oxide to finish off the batch. After washing off the polish, I burnish the tears with new beads and clean water for 1 or 2 hours. The tears come out with a bright, mirror finish. For burnishing you can use a few drops of Dawn dishwashing liquid.

I have processed many kinds of rock in my vibratory tumbler with excellent results. But then nothing can beat experience. So get yourself a vibratory tumbler and get that experience for yourself.
